PGY1 Rotation Line: Non-Compliant Example

- Does not provide exposure to Clinical Experience D
- Does not provide exposure to minimum four discreet terms

In this example, a trainee would undertake two Emergency and two General Medicine terms thus equating to only 3 discreet terms.

This rotation line would need to be restructured to achieve compliance. This can be done by:

A) Changing one of the Emergency or General Medicine terms to an alternative clinical unit

OR

B) If the two General Medicine terms are being undertaken in different clinical focuses (eg. Neurology, Respiratory), it may be possible to achieve compliance through submitting a change in post application demonstrating that these are two discreet terms. This should be discussed with the PMCV Accreditation team in the first instance.

 Does not provide exposure to Emergency and/or General Practice


In this example, although the trainee will have exposure to all four Clinical Experiences, PGY1 doctors must undertake an Emergency and/or GP term.

This rotation line would need to be restructured to achieve compliance.

 Exceeds maximum time permitted (50%) in specialty (including its subspecialties)

In this example, the trainee is undertaking three medical terms. Only 50% (two terms) is permitted at the PGY1 level.

This rotation line would need to be restructured to achieve compliance. This can be done by:

Changing one of the medical terms (Geriatrics, Neurology or General Medicine) to a non-medical term.

-  No more than 25% in any one subspecialty and no more than 50% in any specialty (including its subspecialties)
-  Exposure to all four Clinical Experiences
